Acorn Family Place is an organization led by staff who grew up being looked after ancestors from all over Turtle Island and even globally. Our organizational roots are in Winnipeg near Nistawayak (Three Points), not far from the place where the Assiniboine River and the Red River meet. Nistawayak was a traditional Indigenous stopping place. We recognize that Treaty 3 Traditional Territory and Shoal Lake First Nation 40 is the primary water source for Winnipeg, and that community until very recently had a water boil advisory.

Our centre is located on Treaty 1 Territory, the original lands of the Anishinaabeg, Cree, Oji-Cree, Dakota and Dene peoples, and homeland of the Métis Nation. These peoples have lived here for many thousands of years have made countless contributions to our region. Indigenous people are still here, many of them are members of our community today and worth celebrating.

As an organization committed to truth and reconciliation and social justice, we have a responsibility to try to change the colonial conditions around us that continue to cause harm to members of our community. We strive to be an agent of change and of social justice, to take the lead from our community, and commit to always trying to do better and be better.

Acorn Family Place

Acorn Family Place is a non-profit, community-based resource family centre which has been working with families in our community for 25 years. Using a strengths-based approach, Acorn Family Place meets families where they are at and walks alongside them in their journeys of living and growing.

We offer a broad range of holistic programs and services aimed at responding to the priorities and needs of families in our community. Our programs range from drop-in and basic needs supplies (food, diapers, clothing, laundry, technology), to group programming (parenting groups, personal development workshops, wellness programming), to individualized support (counselling, resource navigation, wraparound supports), to onsite early childhood education and pre-employment programming.







We work in partnership and collaboration with a network of other agencies in the community to facilitate access to a broad range of supports to respond to the unique needs of each family.

In 2023-24, Acorn Family Place had over 30,000 participant contacts throughout our programs and services, serving approximately 2000 unique community members.

Executive Director's Message



There was much to celebrate at Acorn Family Place in 2023-24. We celebrated twenty-five years of our centre's history of walking alongside families in their journeys. We were honoured in this celebration by a Member's Statement from our MLA, Minister Lisa Naylor, in the Legislature. We were also honoured with a Community Service Award on International Women's Day by Mayor Scott Gillingham. We celebrated the first successful year of our Caring Dads program and the expansion of critical programs like our WrapAround and Counselling programs. We celebrated milestones in families' lives. In summer 2024, we hosted our inaugural Acorn Family Place Fundraising Fashion Show -highlighting the spirit of Acorn Family Place, with beautiful, donated clothes from our Clothing Depot, generous donated prizes, and the courageous, joyful talent on display of our participant models of all ages as they strutted their stuff on the runway.

The year had its share of challenges as well. As the cost of living continues to rise, families struggle to make ends meet (amongst other barriers) and so do community organizations. As we face these challenges, we are grateful for the support of our community – our staff, volunteers and Board members, our community partners, our donors and funders. We are grateful for the leadership that our community members demonstrate in shaping our centre, and contributing to the vibrant, welcoming sense of community that makes Acorn Family Place what it is.

On a personal note, in summer of 2024, after six rewarding years at Acorn Family Place, I have decided to move on from my role as Executive Director. This was a difficult decision for me to make. I love this community and this centre and the amazing things that go on here and it will be hard to walk away from. I'm proud of what our team has accomplished over the past 6 years, and Acorn Family Place is in a very strong place and poised to walk into its next chapter in a good way, with the support of our community.

We have a wonderful team of dedicated, skilled staff who know our community and have established valued relationships and expertise in what they do. We have an excellent Board who is dedicated to our mission and is well-equipped to guide our future, in keeping with the values that Acorn Family Place has been guided by over the last 25 years.


While we are sad to see Emma leave, we are excited about her future and the impact she will continue to have on our city. It has been a true privilege.

- $\bullet \ \, \text{This year we distributed 1109 food hampers to help families meet their food security needs.}$
- Participants in our Food Connections program, who are all parents of young children who face barriers to employment, worked 2,480 hours of supported, paid work shifts.
- Our counselling program offered 471 counselling sessions during the year.
- We provided 261+ bus tickets, 1280 hygiene products, and 2827 people accessed technology (phone or computers) at our centre.
- Our Drop-in remained at the heart of our centre, with 10,440 visits.
- Our Personal Development program offered 235 individual sessions and 1 series of personal development workshops.
- For the first time at AFP, we hosted two 17-week series of the Caring Dads program.
- In total, we hosted 4 series of group Parenting programs, as well as individual certificate series, with 29 caregivers completing parenting program series throughout the year.
- Our Playroom saw 4691 visits from children and hosted programs like the beloved Music Circle, Wiggle, Giggle and Munch, and outdoor summer programs.
- Our WrapAround program completed its third year, supporting 60 families who have CFS involvement or risk.


